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
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### Ruth Sleeper Suite Dedication June 6, 2022

### **RUTH SLEEPER SUITE**

Named in honor of Ruth Sleeper, RN, BS, MA "Mass General Hospital Nurses And the MGH School of Nursing, 1873-1981

Mass General Hospital (MGH) nurses have always been the cornerstone of compassionate, innovative care — masterful in both the art and science of nursing. Nearly 8,000 nurses matriculated through the MGH School of Nursing (MGH SON), each generation adding to the body of nursing knowledge, enhancing clinical practice, and defining what professional nursing would look like for generations to come.

Ruth Sleeper, RN, BS, MA (MGH SON Class of 1922), served as director of the MGH School of Nursing and the MGH Nursing Service from 1946 - 1966. She reinvented nursing education to encompass academics, clinical preparation, and professional acumen - a model that became the national standard for nursing education. Sleeper was an influential voice in the World Health Organization, the International Council of Nursing, and the Florence Nightingale International Foundation.

The Ruth Sleeper Suite stands as a timeless tribute to a visionary nursing leader and to all MGH nurses whose dedication to excellence has elevated nursing practice here at the MGH and around the world.

Monday evening, June 6, 2022, the area on Bulfinch 2 adjacent to the Trustees' Room was named and dedicated as, "The Ruth Sleeper Suite." Fourteen alumni were present, representing classes from 1953 - 1981. Offering remarks were the MGH's President, Chief Nurse, and Chief Medical Officer, and our NAA President. Also in attendance were the IHP President and several members of their administration including the chair of their Board of Trustees. Two of Miss Sleeper's great nieces also attended. The event was organized, orchestrated and decorated by members of the MGH Department of Development and the Russell Museum staff. Following the ceremonies attendees adjourned to the Liberty Hotel for a delightful wine and hors d'oeuvres reception.

It was a moment of real celebration, a fitting space in the heart of the hospital that offers tribute to one of our most distinguished graduates; that acknowledges the uniquely rich contributions of the school and all of its graduates; that recognizes the importance of nurses and nursing to the MGH and the larger community.

At our 150th anniversary celebration next year, the president's reception on Friday evening will occur there so attendees will get a closer look.

### **IHP News**

- \* The NAA Board members continue to present our scholarships at IHP events, either virtually or in person.
- \* This year, for the first time in several years, an IHP student submitted a paper for our NAA \$1000. cash grant. The paper is titled, "A Review of Evidence Regarding Hormonal Contraceptive Use and Depression in Healthy Women."
- \* The **Natalie Petzold Endowed Lecture** was held May 2, 2022 on the IHP campus. This annual lectureship is named in honor of and supported by a bequest from Natalie Petzold. The last Director of the MGH SON, she then served as Director of Student Services at the IHP during the transition from the SON to the IHP. The lecturer was Tim Cunningham, RN, DrPH, MSN, FAAN. Dr Cunningham is an advocate for well-being and an expert in wellness practices. He currently serves as the Co-Chief Well-being Officer and Vice President of Practice and Innovation for Emory Healthcare.
- \* The IHP will again be holding its fundraising gala September 15, 2022. The NAA will donate \$5000. for five tickets.
- \* IHP is launching two new master of science leadership programs in the SON: MS Leadership in Nursing Administra tion and MS Leadership in Nursing Education. These programs will offer course work in several of the IHP's programs and focus on justice, equity, diversity and inclusion. They describe it as, "unique and boundary spanning in equipping the next generation of thought leaders in nursing."

### Class News, class of 1976

Due to an ill-defined quirk of modern technology, news of the class of 1976 disappeared into the cloud or somewhere, and was omitted from the 2022 edition of *The Alumni Record*. We publish it below to correct the omission. Thanks to Connie Ryan, class agent, for retrieving the news. Editor

Marie McDonald Fahey writes "it was a very intense three-year diploma program, which I entered as a naive 17 year old. Did we really graduate almost 46 years ago? I worked initially at New England Sinai Hospital (respiratory, chronic and rehab hospital) in Stoughton and I was promoted to Head Nurse 6 months after graduation from MGH! After a year there, I decided to return to acute care nursing at a general hospital. I worked at Cardinal Cushing Hospital (now Good Samaritan) for nine years on a variety of floors...med/surg/ ortho and pediatrics. I returned to school at Bridgewater State College and got a BS in Psychology in 1995. I also attended Cambridge College and received an M.Ed. in School Nursing. I was a School Nurse Fellow at Rutgers University in the Center for Alcohol Studies. I continued taking graduate level courses in subjects such as diversity, autism, and child abuse to further strengthen my school nursing skills. I started school nursing full time in 1987 and I have been in that discipline ever since! I obtained National Certification in School Nursing in 1990.I have been the Nurse Leader for our Regional School District for over 25 years. I wrote several grants for the Health Services Department that infused over two million dollars in our school health program. I recently completed my 33rd year in School Health Services and I have officially retired from the BRRSD- Bridgewater-Raynham Regional School District as of June 2020. Due to the remote learning model in March of 2020, there was not time for a smooth transition for the new nurse leader. I assisted a few hours a month to help her with the scope of conditions for the CSHS grant. For the past two years, since the pandemic began, I have been working a few hours a week for the Bridgewater Board of Health doing COVID interviews and contact tracing calls. I am finishing that work this month. My education at MGH SON was the best foundation for a fulfilling career. My focus for my future is going to include traveling with my husband Stephen and our family. We are planning to take my two sons (Brian and Sean) and their wives along with our 4 grandchildren to Disney World in June for a week. We are starting to book a couple cruises for this year also. We can't put off enjoying life...we don't know what lies ahead! I hope 2022 is a happy and healthy year for all!"

Barb Barton Zorzie writes "I have worked a variety of nursing positions in a variety of disciplines since graduating from MGH, including CCU, MICU, charter staff member of brand new Trauma/Neuro unit, occupational/foundry health, outpatient psych at a school/workshop for developmentally disabled, and retired 4 years ago after several years of school nursing. I have volunteered over the years with the Epilepsy Foundation of America, our regional epilepsy office, served on the boards of community foundation, local home health agency, and various committees and boards at our church as well as devoted time to multiple charities over the years. Paul and I have retired to Lake Greenwood, South Carolina full time almost 2 years ago, enjoying boating, swimming, bonfires and entertaining family and friends. We have 3 children, all married, and have 3 grandchildren." I'm leading the clinical team for the Covid-19 Response Team that conducts case investigation, contact tracing and clinical consultation. Prior to being activated to the response I was a Nurse Care Evaluator for the Rhode Island Department of Health conducting inspections of LTC and AL facilities. It has been an amazing wild ride in the response.
